THE INSTRUMENTS

Bass Psaltery

Winter Harp's five-foot tall bass psaltery is the only one like it in the world. Psalteries, generally smaller in size, date back 3,000 years to Sumeria. Our small psaltery is similar to those played in medieval times.

Nyckelharpa

The Swedish nyckelharpa has four strings which are bowed and 12 sympathetic strings which give it its rich resonant tone. A series of keys produce the different notes. It was replaced after medieval times by the violin.

Organistrum

The organistrum, the forerunner of the hurdy-gurdy, dates back to 9th century Spain when it was used to accompany Gregorian chant. Winter Harp's organistrum is a replica based on a 12th century stone carving in Spain.

Hurdy-gurdy

Like the organistrum, the hurdy-gurdy's sound is produced by turning a crank attached to a rosined wheel that 'bows' the strings. Different notes are produced by wooden tangents that press the strings, changing the pitch.

The Harps

The classical harp has 47 strings and 7 foot pedals which change the strings from sharp to natural to flat. The Celtic harp has levers across the top which sharpen the strings when engaged. Celtic harps range in size and string amounts from 22 to 40.

Anglo Concertina

The concertina, a small cousin of the accordion, originated in Germany in the 1800s. It soon became popular in England, Ireland and North America. English makers modified it, creating their own version known as the Anglo concertina.
